CORRYMEELA CENTRE REBUILD

In February 1997 the main residential unit at the Corrymeela Centre, Ballycastie, will be demolished and a year long rebuilding programme commence. Since purchasing the property in 1965, the 'House' has undergone minor extensions and alterations but is now at a point where it must be fully rebuilt. The total cost the rebuilding project is £1.3 million, of which two-thirds has already been secured. We would ask for your help towards this target through holding fund-raising events, donations, ideas or whatever. This is a greatly needed facility which will enable Corrymeela to continue to support and encourage dialogue amongst individuals and groups and assist in the breaking down of the mistrust and hatred which remains in our community. The Fellowship of Reconciliation (FOR) has asked members of the new negotiating Forum in Northern Ireland to 'chance their arm' in the coming days and months. It has done this not in the sense of asking people to become 'chancers' but in a meaning of the term which dates from 1492. In this year the Earl of Ormond had taken refuge in the Chapter House in St Patrick's Cathedral in Dublin; his enemy the Earl of Kildare, who was pursuing Ormand, cut a hole in the door and reached out his hand to grasp that of Ormand, and so reconciliation was effected. WOMEN TOGETHER FOUNDER DIES

Ruth Agnew, founder of Women Together in 1970, died aged 84 at the beginning of June. Together with Monica Patterson, Ruth Agnew set up the first group in East Belfast and their first public meeting in September 1970 had 400 women at it; Women Together was soon in the thick of things. Today Women Together is continuing to develop involving women in the work for peace.
