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KEEPING THE GENIE IN THE BOTTLE

Northern Ireland's first action against genetically-modified food took place in Belfast on Saturday 25th October. Two dozen activists (from Belfast Friends of the Earth (FOE), Queen's University Green Action and various Critical Mass-ers) carried out a supermarket demo in Tesco's city centre store. A dozen check-outs were brought to a halt as activists put full trolleys of food through the till and then refused to pay until they could be guaranteed that none of it was genetically modified. Meanwhile leaflets outlining the health and environmental implications of genetically engineered food were then distributed by the remaining activists to explain the action to shoppers. One activist, dressed as a scientist, jokingly thanked shoppers on behalf of the biotech industry for taking part in a global experiment and then met with the management to explain the action. The action continued outside once activists had been asked to leave; members of the public were invited to show their preference for 'real' or genetically modified food by placing potatoes in a 'spudometer' (a public opinion

PURSUING PEACE - the text

(see end of previous page; a short commentary appears with the text in the leaflet but is not included here);

1. There is no military solution to our conflict. The Northern Ireland conflict needs to be addressed politically.

2. Compromise is essential. 3. Wrongs have been committed on all sides and this needs to be acknowledged.

4. We also need to acknowledge the corrosive lack of trust we have in each other at all levels. 5. Unresolved issues of justice continue to aggravate our divisions. 6. Peace requires structures for future government within Northern Ireland with links to the rest of the island and to Britain; the majority of people from both traditions must give their consent to these structures if they are to take responsibility for them. 7. Healing requires that we take our share of responsibility for those things which damage our relationships. 8. The inclusion of all as the goal of genuine peace will best be served by inclusive negotiation. 9. A genuine peace process involves all of us. 10. Risk cannot be avoided in moving forward. 11. There will be different stages on the journey toward a lasting peace; dealing with these stages will require patience and a long-term commitment to the process.

12. Agreeing structures as part of a political settlement is only the beginning of a much longer process of healing.

NEW PATHWAYS - Developing a peace process in Northern Ireland

To use a totally inappropriate metaphor, would we know a peace process if one hit us over the head? Well, this latest 28-page offering from the Falth and Politics Group (titled as above) seeks to offer a check list. Starting off with reflections on the peace process to date, it looks at fundamentals (e.g. finding a partner, trust, consent) before moving on to 'important issues' such as decommissioning, the early release of prisoners and parity of esteem (to be confused, or not, with 'parity of letting off steam' - Ed). SCORPIONS IN A BOTTLE - Conflicting cultures in Northern Ireland

John Darby's latest offering, published by the Minority Rights Group (MRG), weighs in at 242 pages for £11.95 in paperback, ISBN 1873194 16.1 (also available in hardback for £35). As might be expected from a guru of ethnic conflict studies, this quite comprehensive overview of the situation places the conflict here in a wider context; it includes history, ancient and modern, analysis of the divisions, an audit of minority rights, and some broader lessons. The book is well illustrated with tables though only one cartoonist's work is used; it includes a chronology and some key documents.
