IRISH CND CONTINUE COMMITMENT TO 'CHILDREN OF CHERNOBYL'

Irish CND has been renewing its commitment to work on the after affects of the Chernobyl disaster of April 1986, and in particular their commitment to send medical aid to 2 hospitals and 2 orphanages. They'll be visiting again in April when they will be filming a documentary about the situation, and taking out a ton of medical supplies. The horrendous figures just emerging include 13,000 killed by the 'clean-up' operation and another 70,000 permanently disabled; meanwhile there has been a 92 per cent increase in childhood cancers and leukemia, and a doubling in birth deformities. A quarter of prime agricultural land in Belarus (neighbouring republic to the Ukraine where Chernobyl is situated) has been lost and may be contaminated for thousands of years.

ICND will be pressing the EC and the UN for a more widespread political response to the situation. Meanwhile they will be again welcoming children affected by Chernobyl in the summer; about 100 children will be hosted in around 8 centres during the month of July, and see the children as ambassadors for the situation. ICND has a 12 minute video available for hire (postage) and would welcome financial contributions to their separate 'Children of Chernobyl Fund'. The January 1993 issue of 'Peace News' contains an article by Adi Roche on the situation and ICND's response. ALTERNATIVES TO VIOLENCE PROGRAMME

The Alternatives to Violence Programme (AVP) is an exciting way to address issues of violence and nonviolence, and was developed by Quakers for work in prisons in USA. It uses workshop exercises which look at core values of nonviolence - respect, affirmation, trust, and building on these, including good listening and dealing with situations in life where anger develops. An AVP network is shaping up in Northern Ireland, composed of people working in probation and others, and aiming to work with offenders. WOMEN OVERCOMING VIOLENCE

This was the title of a conference in Thailand organised by the WRI Women's group in association with local groups and involving women from 63 countries. It started on 25th November - International Day Against Violence Against Women - and ended on 1st December - which WRI celebrates as Prisoners for Peace day; this symbolised perfectly the links the conference was making between militarism and the violence against women - the war against women which goes on in all countries every day, even in peace time. Since the conference has ended the world media have taken up 2 issues; the systematic rape of women in ex-Yugoslavia, and the harassment of women by UN 'peacekeeping' troops in Cambodia.

Proposals from the conference include 1) celebrating 25th November (as above) 2) celebrating 8th March, International Women's Day, and the work of women in crossing the line in regional conflicts 3) supporting Thai groups working on prostitution.
